



Interim Activity Report submitted by Centro de Informacion May 29, 2018

Social Services Provided

With the support of Elgin Township, Centro de Informacion provides bilingual information, referral, advocacy, crisis support, employment assistance and job fairs, legal clinics, housing assistance, parenting training, public aid information, and life skills seminars to, principally, Spanish-speaking immigrant residents of Elgin Township.

Elgin Township Clients

In the first six months, 87% of Centro clients have had incomes below the Federal Poverty Level and 93% below 200% of poverty. Bilingual services have been provided to children (14%), youth (5%), adults (68%), and seniors (13%). In these six months, Centro provided services to more than 2,000 township clients from 24 countries plus Puerto Rico. Within this population, 86% speak only Spanish or very limited English.

Emergency Services

Among the Elgin Township men, women, and children who have come to Centro for services in the past six months, almost half (44%) have come for one or more emergency services: children's clothing and coats, housing (eviction notice, foreclosure, lack of utilities, or homeless), food, family crises, victims of fraud, violence, or accidents, with official looking papers they cannot read, bills they cannot pay, or legal, medical or mental health issues. Even with the current anti-immigrant sentiment and fear in the Hispanic community, in Elgin Township Spanish-speaking families in crisis who do not know where to turn for answers or the help they need come to Centro de Informacion.

Information and Referral

From October 1, 2017 through March 31, 2018, attendance totaled 183 Elgin Township residents at 14 seminars and legal clinics that Centro held on such topics as citizenship, health insurance, finding employment, two 10-week courses on living with diabetes, Social Security, income tax, parenting without abuse, bankruptcy, food safety, fraud, and public benefits and community resources. These were presented through collaboration with local attorneys, bilingual professionals in the community, and partner organizations such as the Gail Borden Library, the Northern Illinois Food Bank, Consumer Credit Counseling, and Presence St. Joseph Hospital.

During this period, Centro relocated its main office when PNC Bank closed its downtown branch and put the North Grove building up for sale. With the exception of a one week hiatus due to the move, individual information, advocacy, and referral was provided daily by Centro bilingual community outreach workers. With Elgin Township support, we answer the questions of what, where, when, why, and how, organize job fairs and medical screenings, and provide interpretation help and assistance in filling out forms in English such as for food stamps, unemployment benefits, victim compensation and consumer complaints through the Illinois Attorney General's office, and various forms of emergency assistance. Finally, we link individuals and families to needed services and supports that Centro does not provide.
